**COURSE DESCRIPTION:** In this course we will examine, analyze, question, and think critically about various contemporary ethical issues through a philosophical lens. We will discuss animal rights, poverty, social media, healthcare ethics, business, and much more. We will also cover essential fundamental philosophical perspectives such as Utilitarianism, Virtue Ethics, and Deontological Ethics.

- Paraphrase the original so that many of the phrases are the same as the original. A good rule is no more than 3 or 4 words in a row should be the same as the original.
- Copy the original sentence pattern, substitution synonyms for key words.
- Neglect to indicate the source of the original material.
